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NATIONAL FOCUS AREA UPDAT

As part of this year's education reviews, Planning and Development have been able to collect information to support the key themes of the 2016 National Focus Area. Through quality discussions with teachers, principals and students, combined with classroom observations, they are building quite an informative picture of what learning looks like in the Cook Islands. What have we been able to see?

Key Theme: Coverage, Integration and Engagement

- There is a strong focus on developing literacy and numeracy, but at the expense of covering the other essential learning areas.
- There is a mixture of pedagogical approaches being used in the classroom with a predominantly teacher-centred focus in our Pa Enua schools.
- There are inconsistencies with analysis of student information and achievement data. Data (quantitative & qualitative) is being collected, but there is little evidence of how analysis is occurring or how data is used to inform future planning and programme development across schools.

Key Theme: Resourcing

- There is sufficient resources to ensure that our learner's needs are being met.
- The current level of IT integration is low but technology adoption for efficiency has most definitely increased.

Key Theme: Physical and Social Environments

Relationships between school leadership, school committee's & Boards and their school communities are very positive.

Committee's and boards are engaged and aware of their responsibilities.

There are quality interactions taking place, with many schools utilising community expertise to support learning.

It is pleasing to see that purposeful connections are being made between staff and students.

Key Theme: Change in Practice

- Schools are recognising the value and importance of targeted professional development opportunities for improving student achievement.
- Schools are engaging in Ministry-led and school-based pedagogical development. Where regular and on-going advisory support has been provided, engagement is high and teachers are increasingly sharing skills and knowledge with students.
- Staff are beginning to understand and live the strategic vision of their school.

Planning and Development are currently looking at a mechanism to engage with those schools who are not involved in the review schedule this year.

Any feedback and discussion from teachers and schools wishing to contribute further to this national focus area is welcome, so please get in touch with any of the Planning and Development team.

As term 3 gets underway there are still a handful of schools that are yet to undertake their annual review

with the Ministry of Educations Planning and Development division. Refer to the list below.

FINANCE NEWS

The Ministry of Education budget for 2016/17 was approved by Parliament in June 2016 to carry out core outputs from the MoE Business Plan.

The new budget is distributed

across the four output areas, Taku Ipukarea Kia Rangatira, Learning and Teaching, Learning and the Community and Infrastructure and Support. The Ministry received a slight increase to the base budget this year in the area of Pa Enua Equity Program, Teacher Training Program, Rental of Pokoinu Hall for Apii Nikao and the Student Information System subscription.

POBOC AND CAPITAL BUDGET

The other budget for the Ministry is the Payment on behalf of Crown (POBOC) and Capital procurement. Capital funding meets the requirements of replacement plans for computers, photocopiers, multi-media items, desks, chairs and other class-room furniture.

This includes an additional \$88k that has been appropriated as support for an ongoing replacement schedule so that schools can maintain the minimum student: device ratio.

- 3. There is a slight decrease in the operational funding due to communication costs now being centrally managed under the new Bluesky agreement therefore no communication charge will be made against school budgets.

4. Reimbursement for payment made by the school through school committee funds must be submitted to the Ministry on a monthly basis.

2017 STATIONARY AND CONSUMABLES

By now all schools should have submitted their annual bulk stationary and consumables for the 2017 school year. We anticipate delivery of the bulk supply by January 2017 for disbursement before school commences in 2017.

REMINDERS FROM FINANCE

Annual Audit Report

Your 2015 audit account is well overdue and thank you to all those schools that submitted their report to the Ministry for the audit process. It is a requirement under the Education Act 2012 for the annual financial report of schools to be audited and furnished to the Ministry. Once the audit is complete the report will be published on our website for accountability and transparency. This is also a requirement under the Public Expenditure Review.

Disaster Management Operation Plan Update

This is a friendly reminder that schools must demonstrate that they are regularly carrying out emergency drills from its
Disaster Management Plan and update key personnel contacts in the event of any emergency.
Ensure emergency resources are well stocked.

Fixed Asset Register (FAR)

A reminder that any assets purchased by the school or received through donation is to be captured in the school's FAR and accounted for as fixed asset in

the financials.

Depreciation expenses also need to be realized on this register.

Payroll

Please ensure staff apply for their leave online and this is approved by the Principal on a timely basis. If staff are unable to do this then the principal or the school secretary can do this on their behalf. If staff are facing any issues with the online ESS, please contact the finance division immediately for assistance. Reminder to please submit timesheets to Mariake every Thursday.

PERFORMANCE MANAGEMENT SYSTEMS


Since the reviewing of the Performance Management System for Cook Islands teachers, a team of Principals and Ministry staff have been working on unpacking the four performance dimensions of the professional standards to better showcase what excellence looks like in Cook Islands schools.

The reviewed system is user friendly and promotes the growth of staff, motivating and empowering them towards demonstrating excellence. The system now provides greater ownership between principals, appraisers and teachers

to engage in quality dialogue. This high level of trust now means that a teachers grade is awarded based on the many conversations they have with their appraisers throughout the year. Teachers will still collect naturally occurring evidence to support these discussions with appraisers, but there won't be an emphasis on compiling folders of evidence.

It is essential that teachers understand that meeting the requirements of your position description and the teacher professional standards will make them a competent teacher.

The current Cook Islands teacher professional standards calls for all dimensions to be demonstrated consistently and extensively for a teacher to be deemed as excellent. By now, teachers should have had several conversations with their appraiser relating to the two strands of accountability to the professional standards and teachers goals for continued professional growth, including at least one formal classroom observation. The unpacked performance dimensions will be shared with all schools once confirmed.
